Bingo's Ice Cream Date

Bingo was about 3 years old when I adopted him from PAW. No one knew all of the Coonhound's history, but it clearly had not been a good life. Bingo was afraid of people—he trembled a lot and didn't want to come out of his crate. When he finally did, he would run and hide under the dining room table and watch everyone from his safe place. I'd try to lure him out with treats, but no treat was ever tempting enough.

Bingo loved the company of my other dogs, but he wouldn't eat in the kitchen with them. He'd retreat to the bedroom near his crate, so I'd put his food bowl there. He always cleaned his plate. Months passed, then years. Bingo now runs into the kitchen to eat. He greets me when I come home from work, enjoys having his ears scratched and gently taking a treat from my hand. And he's OK with meeting people who come to the house.

I thought my sweet boy might be ready for a group obedience class, especially since he likes the company of other dogs, but at the first class, he shook the whole time and wouldn't take a treat. So I took one of my other dogs to the next class with Bingo, leashed Bingo to the piano in the room, and trained near him with my other dog. Bingo finally stopped shaking. By the end of the 8-week course,

he was relaxed enough to lie on a blanket and watch the class. But he still wouldn't take a treat, so training there was out of the question.

Bingo seems happiest when he's running around the backyard as I shout, "Go-go-go Bingo!" Every time I shout, he runs faster and has a big grin on his face. Sometimes he'll slow down for a moment to pick up his red rope toy, run with it, then drop it 10 feet away from me. Then I "retrieve" the toy, throw it across the yard, and watch Bingo race around again. Go-go-go Bingo!

When a friend with a Golden Retriever asked me to meet them at a dog-friendly ice cream place, I took Bingo. He sniffed the Golden in the parking lot and wagged his tail happily. The Golden reciprocated. But when he stood in line with me, Bingo tucked his tail. My friend ordered her ice cream and got a complimentary ice cream "sundae" (a small scoop of vanilla ice cream with a dog biscuit in

it) for her Golden. At first, I refused a sundae for Bingo, explaining that he'll only eat in the comfort of his home.

But I took the ice cream anyway, thinking the Golden could have an extra one. We all sat on the grass, away from the crowd and the Golden slurped up the doggie sundae while Bingo watched. I put a sundae in front of Bingo and, to my astonishment, he started licking it cautiously. Then he licked some more. And more! He ate almost all of it!

Some people are pleased when their dog retrieves a ball or rolls over on command. My dog eats ice cream in public and I'm over the moon. Go-go-go Bingo!

Delila—Looking for a Home

Delila, a 2-year-old Pointer mix, was hit by a car and ended up with a badly broken leg. For days after the accident, her owner—instead of taking her to a vet—left her outside in the yard, surrounded by debris and without even the basics, such as shelter or water. Thankfully, a concerned neighbor called and reported her lack of care and Animal Control took her away. Delila spent the next 2 weeks at the shelter, awaiting a rescue organization willing to fix her leg. Thanks to our wonderful supporters who sent in donations, PAW was able to take her in and get her the treatment she so badly needed.

Due to the nature of the break, Delila required tricky orthopedic surgery as the fracture was just above the first joint of her front leg. Thankfully, the surgeon felt she could save the leg despite the precarious location of the

break. The surgery required cleaning out the cartilage that had started forming through the self-healing process and the use of pins and an external fixator to stabilize the fracture. The fixator and pins remained in her leg for 6 long weeks. During this time Delila

received physical therapy and had to be on cage rest and restricted exercise. A hard request to make of a young pup!

A few days after Delila's surgery she stopped eating and tests revealed that on top of the broken leg she had also come into contact with parvovirus. This is a very serious illness from which young and unvaccinated dogs are at risk. Delila spent several days under 24-hour emergency care, receiving IV fluids and antibiotics, followed by another week of isolation while she finished shedding the virus and finally tested negative.

Poor Delila has had a lot of bad luck in her short life so far, but we are working hard to change that. Throughout her whole ordeal, this sweet dog has maintained her loving temperament and now she is ready for the wonderful forever home that all PAW volunteers dream about for these precious dogs. ***Can you help her find it?***

A New Beginning for Coco

When our older dog died, just after Thanksgiving 2008, we knew that our younger guy, Roscoe, would need a companion to help keep him fit and occupied. Little did we know how much Coco would change his life. We never could have dreamed how fortunate we were to have Coco enter our lives.

We met Coco at a PAW adoption show on Valentine's Day 2009, after seeing her online, on the PAW website. She is a German Shepherd mix, like Roscoe, but bigger than he is. Coco was severely underweight at that time, but had a beautiful face; she also seemed to be very shy. The PAW volunteers told us that she was just starting to recover from the effects of abandonment and multiple illnesses. They voiced some concern that she might not recover if she was not adopted soon. She and Roscoe

traded sniffs and appeared to get along so we proceeded with a quick adoption. As we all settled into our new life together, Coco turned out to be a real surprise—far from being shy and retiring, she quickly regained her health to become a happy, gregarious addition to our household.

Roscoe wasn't pleased at first, when Linda from PAW brought Coco to her new home, but after a couple of days and a good romp in the snow, Coco accepted him as the alpha dog. This was a new experience for Roscoe, who at 10



years old had never been a leader. Even now, after 2 years together, Coco follows him around like a puppy. Roscoe has slowed down quite a bit recently; he is arthritic and has other, more serious health issues. At 70 lbs, Coco could easily knock him over in her exuberance, but she seems to sense his vulnerability and gives him space to maneuver from room to room. At feeding time, she won't start eating until Roscoe begins and she turns down treats unless Roscoe gets one first.

Coco is very affectionate with us and loves attention. She is the first one up every morning and comes into our bed-

room to wake us up with the thumping of her tail against the door and a few licks on the elbow. She likes to snooze in Madilyn's office while she is working, and in the family room with both of us after dinner. She nudges us when she wants a scratch behind the ears and she gives kisses freely.

Sadly, Coco showed signs of having been mistreated in her earlier life. She would hide whenever we took out a broom or a rake or anything with a long handle. She would recoil and growl when touched on her hips or her tail, but she has overcome both of those issues and has learned that we are trustworthy. She is curious about (and underfoot) whatever household or garden chores we are doing.


Coco looks for any excuse to run—squirrels, rabbits, or just energetic circles around the yard—and she does a happy dance whenever we reach for her harness and leash. Her exuberance was a problem on walks at first, but she is very smart and learned to heel on command within her first couple of days. The only residual problem has been her protectiveness while on leash. Sometimes it requires extra effort to get her attention when she sees another dog while on a walk, but Coco loves dog parks. She is very interested

in other dogs and just wants to play.

Her many nicknames—Happy Dancer, Thumper (for her ever-thumping tail!), and Tigger to name a few—are a testament to her high-spirited, fun-loving nature. We couldn't be happier or more in love with Coco, or more grateful to PAW for giving us the chance to have her in our lives.

And two weeks ago, when we sang happy birthday for the last time, she was as happy as she could be. She ate pound cake for dessert and had mashed potatoes, rice, carrots and scrambled eggs for lunch—her favorite! Later that month, she peacefully passed away, surrounded by all of us.

My advice to anyone is to stretch out your hands and hearts and foster or adopt an animal. They give you so much in return. Samba was the love of our lives and was part of a beautiful friendship, between us and a dog, and between my family and Amy. Thank you for that, Samba. You became the brightest star in the sky.

In Memory of Kisses




Kisses
